



The Scarlet and Black Project is a historical exploration of the experiences of two disenfranchised populations, African Americans and Native Americans, at Rutgers University. Its initial work began with *Scarlet and Black, Volume 1: Slavery and Dispossession in Rutgers History*, published in 2016, which traced the university's early history, uncovering how the university benefited from the slave economy and how Rutgers came to own the land it inhabits. To share that research with a wider audience, the project now introduces these historical walking tours, open to members of the public and communities across Rutgers.
